Challenge	Inequitable distribution of funding, physical resources, and human resources	Persistent inequities in how students are recruited, auditioned, and enrolled	Low teacher pay and professional expenses (student loan debt, certification, etc.)
Solution	Advocate for Title I and Title IV-A funding in your district, which can be used to support a well-rounded education that includes music.	Partner with higher education to ensure that underserved schools and marginalized students are better prepared for applications and interviews.	Advocate for increased state and federal funding to support livable salaries and loan forgiveness and to provide stipends or reimbursement for certification and professional development costs.
Challenge	Participation, transportation, and private instruction expenses	Lack of alignment between university program content and professional expectations in PK-12 instruction	Isolation stemming from geography or being the only music teacher in a building
Solution	Create flexible scheduling options and partner with foundations, community arts providers, or universities to ensure that all students have access to private lessons regardless of background or family income.	Encourage collaboration with school districts to revise music education curriculum to be more culturally sustaining, equitable, and reflective of the needs of schools and communities.	Provide professional learning communities for music educators to feel connected to one another as a way to counter feelings of isolation.
Challenge	Limited curricular offerings		Lack of funding and time for meaningful professional development and mentoring.
Solution	Expand the curriculum to include more opportunities for students with a variety of musical interests and skill levels.		Provide continual and free (or highly subsidized) content-specific professional development experiences for music educators.
