BEFORE THE DEGREE PROGRAM



Challenge

Inequitable distribution of funding, physical resources, and human resources

Solution

Increase funding for Title I and Title IV-A of the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) to ensure students have equitable access to a well-rounded education that includes music.

Challenge

Participation, transportation, and private instruction expenses

Solution

Adopt legislation to clarify how states can support and encourage music education.

Challenge

Negative perceptions of the teaching profession

Solution

Launch a campaign to promote the value of music education in schools and music education as a viable profession.

DURING THE DEGREE PROGRAM



Persistent inequities in how students are enrolled

Provide financial support for application preparation, waive application fees, and create partnerships between colleges and high schools to ensure students from marginalized backgrounds are aware of and prepared for college entrance and enrollment.

Lack of financial support to meet students' needs

Increase funding for the TEACH grants, include the costs of clinical experiences in the overall cost of attendance when awarding financial aid, and offer stipends for student teaching.



DURING THE FIRST 5 YEARS OF PROFESSIONAL LIFE



Low teacher pay and professional expenses (student loan debt, certification costs, etc.)

Increase salaries, raises, bonus structures, tax credits, and other financial incentives to entice new music teachers into the field.

Lack of funding and time for meaningful professional development and mentoring.

Increase funding for Title II of ESSA and reauthorize the Higher Education Act to ensure teacher preparation programs include strong clinical experience, rigorous requirements and training for mentors, and ongoing mentoring and support for new educators, which research shows increase educator retention and effectiveness.
